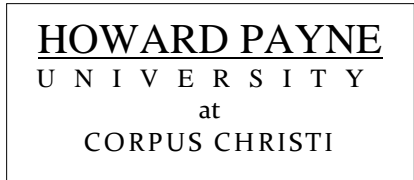

Course Descriptions

BIB 1304 Introduction to the New Testament An introductory survey of the New Testament, including its background, the Gospels, the Acts and Epistles and the Apocalypse. *Replaces MIN 1114, 1115, and 1116.*

BIB 3321 Life and Letters of Paul A careful study of the life and letters of Apostle Paul including the philosophical, historical and theological background to first century Christianity. *Cross-credited with CCS 3321.*

BIB 4331 Hebrew Prophets An intensive study of the Old Testament Prophetic Books: Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel and the twelve Minor Prophets. Attention is given to the historical and literary contexts, the message, and the interpretation of these books.

CED 2355 Topics in Bivocational Ministry A study of topics, issues, methods, models, and challenges of bivocational Christian ministry. *Cross-credited with PTH 2355.*

CED 4331 Introduction to Christian Care and Counseling An introduction to the theological, practical and philosophical distinctives of counseling from a Christian worldview. Emphasis will be given to recognizing the scope and limits of appropriate care and counseling for professional and non-professional care givers and on practical helps for specific caring opportunities in the Christian community. *Cross-credited with YMN 4331.*

MIN 1119 The Work of the Minister A study of the day-to-day tasks and challenges of the contemporary minister. Attention will be given to such tasks as conducting weddings, funerals, church ordinances, and church business meetings, and to the ministry of pastoral care.

MIN 1126 Christian Missions An introductory study of missions with emphasis on the Biblical and doctrinal basis of missions. Current and future strategies will be analyzed and a personal mission statement will be formulated.

MIN 1127 Leadership Among Ministry Volunteers A study of leadership in the context of ministry. Attention will be given to the role of volunteer leaders in ministry. Strategies for enlisting and training volunteer leaders will be formulated and analyzed.

MIN 1128 Church and Personal Finance An introduction to essentials of financial stewardship. Attention will be given to financial direction on the personal and congregational levels in ministry. Focus will be placed upon tithing, budgeting, taxes, insurance, and retirement.

MIN 1129 Bivocational Ministry A study of the methods, models, and challenges of bivocational Christian ministry. Attention will be given to issues unique to dual-career ministers.

PTH 3200 Supervised ministry Opportunities will be provided for students to receive on-the-job experience in the practice of ministry under supervision, and to be given evaluation and assessment of that experience. *Cross-credited with CCS 3200, CED 3200, and YMN 3200.*

PTH 4312 Advanced Preaching A study of the principles of expository sermon preparation with a focus on biblical exposition and exploring various sermon forms and vital issues relating to the preaching task. Emphasis will be on sermon preparation, rather than delivery.

PTH 4331 History of Christianity A general survey of the Christian movement from its beginning to the present time. Special attention will be given to significant individuals, selected ideas, movements and institutions which have influenced Christian theology.

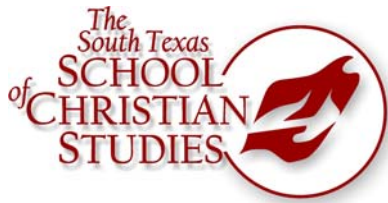

Course Descriptions

BIBL 6300 Introduction to the Bible Introduction to the history of the Bible, biblical hermeneutics, and the historical/cultural setting of the Bible.

BIBL 6332 Interpreting the Old Testament II Introduction to the interpretation of the Old Testament, focusing on background issues, interpretive methodologies, biblical content, and theological implications for the church.

HEBR 6301 Biblical Hebrew I Accelerated introduction to biblical Hebrew, focusing on grammar, vocabulary, syntax, and translation.

MISS 6300 Christian Mission and the Contemporary Church An examination of the cultural context for missionary activity today, especially as the Christian mission centers in and moves out from the local church. Topics will include post-modernity and its characteristics, as well as contemporary models of the church. Emphasis will be placed upon Western missiology, ecclesiology, and methodology, especially as presented by representative authors from North America, Great Britain, and Australasia.

MNST 6000 Spiritual Formation Colloquium A consideration of the spiritual formation of the minister through the experience of corporate worship, guided theological reflection and dialogue with the graduate theological community.

MNST 6201-C Preparation for Ministry An introduction to the preparation for Christian ministry in the church including the understanding of call, development of personal spiritual disciplines, academic preparation, and the diversity of forms of ministry.

MNST 6331-C Teaching Ministry in the Church Examination of the various means by which a church functions as an educational institution. Particular attention will be given to the development and evaluation of curricula by which a church's educational task of spiritual formation may be accomplished.

MNST 6342 Supervision in Ministry II Two-semester course based upon the student's substantial leadership experience in an approved ministry setting throughout an entire academic year. Through field supervision, faculty direction, and peer interaction the student is challenged to grow in the capacity for theological reflection, the mastery of ministry skills, the development of personal spiritual maturity, and the ability to nurture healthy interpersonal relationships.

MNST 6350 Evangelism and Church Growth Study and analysis of the various concepts emphasized in the church growth movement in light of the biblical and theological foundations for understanding the Church's evangelistic mandate with a view to the development of a viable approach to evangelism and church growth.

THEO 6101 Graduate Theological Research Introductory practice of graduate theological research and writing.

THEO 6290 Capstone Seminar Seminar taken in the final semester of the Master of Divinity and Master of Arts in Family Ministry programs which is designed to assist the student in integrating the components of the theological curriculum, discovering areas in which continued growth in understanding is especially needed, and applying resources gained in theological study in ministry settings.
